## **ExComm MINUTES**

Meeting results should be published in the newsletter periodically. We will try to start doing this as closely as possible to the actual date of the meeting. ExComm meetings are open to all members, although only elected officers can vote. Meetings often take place immediately before Saturday brunches, but the date and time are usually posted in the newsletter and on our website. This is your group; feel free to contact any ExComm member with your ideas, issues, or concerns! We can only act on what we hear from you.

### **Overview of ExComm Meeting Minutes, 7/17/2004**

ExComm Elected Officers present: Sherry McNamara, Sue Styles, Ellen Monahan, Melissa Rennie, Jack Schultz. Other members present: Stephen Siciliano.

Treasurer's Report (Ellen): We have a balance of about \$2,677, not including outstanding bills for printing the June newsletter and mailing tests to the national office. Sixty of eighty-nine current members are getting *Borealis* via email.

Proctor Coordinator's Report (Jack): Since NMM began in 8/02, we have earned \$950 from testing fees. \$412.50 is since August of 2003. Since January 2004: \$287.50.

Webmaster's Report (Stephen): The website has a new look, and the ExComm now has a way to update any page so everything doesn't have to go through Stephen. Also, now that Stephen has the website on his own server, he will work with the new newsletter editor on simpler ways to send *Borealis* via email.

Membership Officer's Report (Melissa): A survey of members who have not renewed their membership revealed a wide variety of reasons (e.g. forgetting, lack of time to participate, moving). There were no major complaints about our local group that led to anyone not renewing. Also, Melissa is still thinking about our group hosting a Regional Gathering (RG) in the future.

Scholarship Chair Appointment: Sherry has discussed this position with Dorothy Vogel, a college and private piano teacher who expressed interest. Sherry has some information to get Dorothy started, and information has been solicited from the previous Scholarship Chair. The ExComm voted to approve this nomination.

Newsletter Editor Appointment: Sherry has talked to several people interested in helping with the newsletter. Michelle Swanson and Ralph Hillquist are the most likely candidates, and Sherry suggested they share the position. Two co-editors would allow for vacations, illnesses, or a "break" from time to time. The ExComm approved appointing Michelle Swanson and Ralph Hillquist jointly as Newsletter Editors.

Program ideas: Free Shakespeare presentations in Elberta and the Michigan Legacy Art Park at Crystal Mountain were suggested as activities for members. There has also been contact with Interlochen about doing some sort of activity or program together.

Membership Handbook Status: [The idea of a membership handbook has been discussed all year. It could contain a directory, activities schedule such as brunch the 2nd Saturday of each month and Annual Picnic in late August every year, and information on the Friend Fund to help members with dues, group funding for CultureQuest®, how the ExComm is elected, etc.] This may be a time-consuming project. The most useful format was discussed, and a new member present said online would indeed have been useful in the absence of a physical document. All agreed that posting information online can benefit new and current members, while allowing for growth over time. We may publish a physical version in the future; for now Jack will begin providing some content to be posted on the website.

**FROM SUE'S CULINARY COLLECTION : Cheesy Potato Soup**

4 c. diced peeled potatoes

3 c. chicken broth

2 c. milk

1 ½ tsp. salt

¼ tsp. pepper

2 c. (8 oz.) shredded cheddar cheese

dash paprika

croutons

fresh chopped parsley

In large saucepan, heat potatoes and broth until simmering. Cover and cook until potatoes are tender, about 12 minutes. Puree potato mixture in a blender, leaving some chunks. Return to saucepan. Stir in milk and seasonings. Add the cheese and heat only until melted. Garnish with croutons and parsley.

# NATIONAL TESTING DAY

Saturday, October 16, was American Mensa's National Testing Day. The theme this year was "Looking for Intelligent Life? Find Mensa." ( While I don't particularly care for that theme, which implies that Mensa is the only place you will find intelligent people, it may have a kind of 'popular appeal' that marketing types look for!) The idea of a national day allows Mensa to put together a theme and seek national publicity for Mensa and for testing. It also gives us a theme to use in our local publicity if we wish, helps us get publicity, and generally creates excitement around the testing process for potential members and local groups. Over 150 local groups participated this year (many with multiple sessions), and locations and times were posted on the AML website. There were 8 sessions in Michigan: four hosted by Southeast Michigan Mensa, two by Western Michigan Mensa, one by Mid-Michigan Mensa, and our own session.

As far as the actual test process, National Testing Day is not much different from a regular test session. Last year we had a site in Gaylord and one in Traverse City, with two participants at each site. This year our Proctor Coordinator, Jack Schultz, was out of town, so I tested two young men in Traverse City. One is from Gaylord, and the other is from Traverse City. Both were very interested in joining if they qualified. The national office is prepared for the deluge of tests after National Testing Day, so they have pledged to have the results back to testees by November 8.

We often get inquiries in response to our publicity from people who end up not being able to attend a particular test session. The same was true this month. A woman from Moran in the UP inquired, as did one from the Rogers City area, and two mothers called on behalf of their teenage children. A current member asked about having his daughter tested, and a young man from Traverse City. These contacts will be added to Jack's master list to be informed of future testing opportunities.
