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### **Mensa:**

Mensa's constitution lists three purposes: to identify and foster human intelligence for the benefit of humanity; to encourage research into the nature, characteristics, and uses of intelligence; and to provide a stimulating intellectual and social environment for its members.

Mensa accepts individuals who score at or above the 98th percentile on certain standardized IQ tests, such as the Stanford-Binet.

**Borealis** is published by Northern Michigan Mensa (3/496) once each month under the auspices of its Executive Committee.

After mandatory items, priority in the newsletter is given to matters appealing to members of the group which relate to their membership in Mensa. The content of the newsletter shall appeal to the general membership of Northern Michigan Mensa.

The newsletter shall not include matters which are indecent, scandalous, libelous, or invade someone's privacy, nor shall copyrighted material be used without the permission of the owner. Ethnic, racist, sexist, or religious slurs shall not be printed. Northern Michigan Mensa recognizes that the newsletter is addressed to both minors and adults; material printed will be appropriate for distribution to minors.

**All submissions** are welcome and encouraged. They may be sent via email or snail mail. They may be sent as attachments or in the body of the email.

Submissions requiring major editing are also welcome. If requested, the author may approve the editing before the article is published.

**Photographs** are also welcome. Please include a brief description of the photo and the name of the photographer. You may also include an entire article to accompany the photo.

Notices should be of a non-commercial nature and include contact information.

### **Deadline:**

The deadline for submissions is the 15<sup>th</sup> of the month before the month of publication.

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## LocSec's Login

Warmest spring greetings to all, even if the weather as I write this is too cold.

I've been thinking lately of how I heard about Mensa, and the feelings I have had about the group. The first is relatively easy. My mother was forever doing puzzle books, and one of the magazines that was around our home was "Games Magazine." Mensa has always advertised there, so from as long as I can remember, I've seen the name, and the association was good: This is something for people that are intellectually curious. Also, since the magazine had a definite playful humor, this became part of my idea of what Mensa would be like.

I have always been sad that my mother never tried to take the test. She had a close friend that was a member and who tried to get her to take it, but since she knew that you could only take it once, as given by Mensa, and since she felt that her math was too weak, she was afraid of it and never tried. That added a note of sadness to how I view Mensa, and more as she never got to see me try and pass it. As achievements go, it isn't a huge one to me, but still, I'd have liked her to have known that.

The other main formative influence on my thoughts towards Mensa was one man: Isaac Asimov. If you're familiar with this scientist, author, and illustrious former Mensan, you don't need me to detail his accomplishments. If you aren't, well.... He was one very interesting person. A writer who not only gained the highest fame through an epic lists of books written, both fiction and non-fiction, but also a scientist with a gift for explaining the complex in a graspable way, as well as a humorist, curious mind, and to imagine it... very humble and human nonetheless.

Whatever I know about science came from reading 'The Magazine of Fantasy and Science Fiction.' Does that sound to you like a good place to rely on for your education in science? If you were skeptical about the quality of information learned here... well... you'd be mostly correct. Most of the time the literary quality was questionable, let alone the science. But you'd be wrong in one important way. When I started reading, from comic books to real books as a child, 'F&SF' was a bridge.

Interestingly, there was enough action, enough stories of different genres to capture my interest, and one very interesting monthly column, a non-fiction science essay by Mr. Asimov.

It was stealthy. Try to force someone to learn science, and you lose them. Add it to a pulp style periodical, and after you've read the "good" stuff, just maybe you'd turn to new ideas. I did. I learned some fundamentals there. Enough to want to know more and that is thanks to one Mensan. From Physics class as well as Chemistry, I remember nothing. It's a blank. From a Mensan's monthly column, I learned more than I could say. I'm sorry I came into Mensa too late to say "thank you" to him before he died. To be part of the same group that he was once active in is a good feeling in my mind.

Since then, my views have evolved somewhat, but it isn't the details that form the longest lasting marks, is it? My views were set long ago by conditions, random or not, and now I have them. I will see Mensa as an enclave of the bright and funny, whether wistfully separated from them as my mother chose, or a real example of the potential of one human with flaws and strengths that shows what is possible for us to think and be, as Mr. Asimov was; my views and affection for this place have been set since I was a kid.

May it live on in more minds, hearts, and feelings for a long time to come.
