Mensa:

Mensa's constitution lists three purposes: to identify and foster human intelligence for the benefit of humanity; to encourage research into the nature, characteristics, and uses of intelligence; and to provide a stimulating intellectual and social environment for its members.

Mensa accepts individuals who score at or above the 98th percentile on certain standardized IQ tests, such as the Stanford-Binet.

Borealis is published by Northern Michigan Mensa (3/496) once each month under the auspices of its Executive Committee.

After mandatory items, priority in the newsletter is given to matters appealing to members of the group which relate to their membership in Mensa. The content of the newsletter shall appeal to the general membership of Northern Michigan Mensa.

The newsletter shall not include matters which are indecent, scandalous, libelous, or invade someone's privacy, nor shall copyrighted material be used without the permission of the owner. Ethnic, racist, sexist, or religious slurs shall not be printed. 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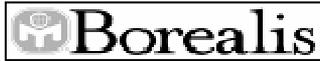

Your American Mensa Committee (board of directors) (AMC) met in a teleconference on Tuesday, October 30. A motion was passed raising the regular dues starting January 1, 2013, to \$70. I voted no on this motion. Mensa membership is invaluable to me. Regardless of yearly dues, I would find a way to be a member. At \$70 per year, that is only \$1.35 a week, less than a cup of coffee almost anywhere. I do hope that the increase will not affect your membership. I am happy to discuss this with you – just email or, if you call, please wait until after noon. A second motion was passed; the official title for coordinators for youth activities in local groups was changed from Gifted Children Coordinator to Gifted Youth Coordinator. I voted yes on this motion.

The National NomComm has completed its work and now is the time for those who wish to run for Chair, 1st Vice Chair, 2nd Vice Chair, Secretary, Treasurer or Region 3 Vice Chair to do so by following American Mensa's petition process which is as follows:

"In accordance with Art. VI, Sec. (4) of the Bylaws of American Mensa, Ltd., nominations for candidacy for office in American Mensa may be made by petition. Each petition must contain the signatures of 50 members of American Mensa in good standing as of December 1, 2012. Petitions must be submitted on [official petition forms](#). Each petition candidate must also submit a completed [Acceptance of Nomination form](#) and a completed [Candidate Information Form](#).

Petition forms, Candidate Information Forms and Acceptance of Nomination forms are available below and may also be obtained by contacting the National Office at Operations@americanmensa.org. You also can start an [online, members-only petition](#) via the Web site. All petition candidates should review the [2013 Code of Election Procedures](#) before beginning the petition process. Members wishing to sign available online petitions may do so via the same link.

Echoes of Distant Thunder

Bibliomensans' Book for December

By Frank P. Slaughter - 279 pages

Echoes of Distant Thunder is a breathtaking saga that begins with the crushing Union defeat on the final day of the Battle of Chickamauga and ends with a life or death confrontation between two sworn enemies in the virgin pine forests of Northern Michigan. This is not the kind of Civil War novel we have come to expect. This book shows us the war in stunning detail through the eyes of a twenty year old artillery soldier. On the bloody fields of Chickamauga Will Castor's artillery battery is over-run by the enemy in fierce hand-to-hand combat, every member of his gun crew, including his best friend are killed and his final violent act of compassion will haunt him for the rest of his life. Caught behind enemy lines with a broken leg and unable to walk, he makes a pact with a war weary Confederate deserter and ends up falling in love with his former enemy's beautiful sister. Will Castor comes home from the Civil War a broken man. This is the story of his journey as he struggles to regain his footing in a world he no longer understands. Along the way he will work in a lumber camp and experience the rough and tumble, and often violent world of the lumberjack. Guilt and alcohol slowly consume him. Guilt from being the only survivor of his gun crew and guilt from killing a Georgia farmer and his son during the hopeless confusion of a fifty thousand man Union army in headlong retreat. When he can go no further, alone in the vast wilderness of North America, five years after the last shot of the Civil War was fired, the war for Will Castor is finally over. Echoes of Distant Thunder will make you laugh and cry. Richly detailed and elegantly written, the characters of Frank Slaughter's novel will draw you in!
