

Election Time Again

Now is the time to start our election process. We will be electing a new Executive Committee to serve for the next two years. The first step is for the Executive Committee to appoint a three-member Nominating Committee. Then, the following events occur.

Election deadlines (from our bylaws):

September 15th	Nominating Committee appointed by ExComm.
October 15th	Nominations for ExComm candidates finalized

and turned over to newsletter editor.

November 1st
November 1st
Election Committee appointed by ExComm.

They select a slate of candidates.

November 15th Last day for election petitions for additional candidates

December 1st Ballots (if necessary) distributed in newsletter.

December 20th Last day to receive ballots from voters.

January 1st 2014 Newly elected board assumes office.

REQUIREMENTS FOR NOMINATING AND ELECTION COMMITTEES

From our bylaws...

"No member of the Nominating Committee or Election Committee may be a voting member of the Executive Committee <u>or</u> a candidate in the upcoming election. The Nominating and Election Committees may comprise the same members."

<u>Duties</u>: It is important to nominate individuals who are willing to serve on the Executive Committee and who will be able to attend a majority of meetings of the ExComm. The NomComm shall contact each nominee to make certain he/she understands what will be expected of each individual and to ascertain whether such nominees are willing to serve in whatever capacity the elected officers may elect them to. It is important to make sure that there are at least three individuals who are willing to be elected LocSec, Deputy LocSec, and Treasurer. Nominations must be presented to the Editor by October 15 so they can be published in the November issue of the newsletter. Additional nominations may be accepted, by petition of at least five members, up to November 15, to appear on the December ballot along with other nominations previously published in the November newsletter.

Right Here Up North - The Port Oneida Fair By Sue Styles, NMM Treasurer

This will surprise some of you, but I have lived up north (in the Northern Michigan Mensa area) for over 75% of my life and have never been to the Sleeping Bear Dunes. At least not the touristy "dune climb". Who wants to get sand in places you didn't even know you had? But I have been to the area a few times, including Mensa sponsored walks at the Treat Farm south of Empire with our very own Jack Schultz, a retired forester.

Recently, I happened to read one of the newspapers that accumulates in my mailbox early enough to actually go to one of the activities publicized. It was the Port Oneida Fair, which takes place in the Sleeping Bear Dunes National Lakeshore. Yet another way to experience our local national "park" without too much sand! Port Oneida was a community of families living near the dunes just north of Glen Arbor. Two local groups, Preserve Historic Sleeping Bear and Friends of Sleeping Bear Dunes, are dedicated to preserving the structures and history of this area. They provide local input to the National Park Service and raise money and volunteers for projects the Park Service might not otherwise make a priority.

The fair is cosponsored by these two groups and I believe has been in existence about ten years. It was a great opportunity to see some aspects of life in the late 1800s and early 1900s. We took our 7-year-old son, who is reluctant to do anything educational but didn't have a choice this time. He ended up really enjoying the day. We got to explore three farm houses and three different kinds of barns; petted giant draft horses; saw oxen and talked to their handler; and watched soap, candles, quilts, pottery, baskets, lace, mittens, butter, and ice cream be made! Our son got interested in the mechanics of how wagons and farm equipment were hitched to animals, and how the equipment worked to do things like pick up hay or pump water. He got to crank a wringer washer, pet rabbits, hold chickens, and stick his head up a silo and hear the echo!

I think the parts my husband enjoyed the most were the cooking and black-smith demonstrations. These were conducted by professional interpreters. Susan Odom of Hillside Homestead used to work at Greenfield Village and now has her own business in Leelanau County, cooking for small groups the way it was done in the area in 1910. She was obviously skilled in the use of a wood stove, using it to make an apple pie as well as jam that cooks for hours, that my husband said was just the way his grandma did it when he was a kid. We learned that bacon back before refrigeration was so dry and hard it took

hours of soaking in water to be able to fry it like today's bacon, but once cooked it tasted just the same! The blacksmith is a regular working blacksmith from the Grand Rapids area who made a variety of metal items while we watched. His work was mesmerizing.

I just soaked up the history and the excitement of learning new things. There were also plenty of vendors if you like to shop for local handmade or historical items. There was a chicken dinner Friday night, which we did not attend, and a night sky viewing party, which we did. The Grand Traverse Astronomical Society brought multiple telescopes, including a huge one, and we got to see Saturn's rings! I think the connection with Port Oneida was that the residents could see the same stars we see, because of how dark it is without a town nearby.

The whole day was very refreshing as well as educational. To have an opportunity like this without driving for hours, was priceless. The Port Oneida Fair is planned for the second Friday and Saturday of August, each year. Admission is free, although they appreciate donations or a Park Entrance Pass. Next year we will probably plan more time and be sure to visit the school house, cemetery, and some of the musical events. And to think I thought the Dunes were only for climbing!

It is a revelation of a dangerous world at the epicenter of political and natural disaster.
