Mensa:

Mensa's constitution lists three purposes: to identify and foster human intelligence for the benefit of humanity; to encourage research into the nature, characteristics, and uses of intelligence; and to provide a stimulating intellectual and social environment for its members.

Mensa accepts individuals who score at or above the 98th percentile on certain standardized IQ tests, such as the Stanford-Binet.

Borealis is published by Northern Michigan Mensa (3/496) once each month under the auspices of its Executive Committee.

After mandatory items, priority in the newsletter is given to matters appealing to members of the group which relate to their membership in Mensa. The content of the newsletter shall appeal to the general membership of Northern Michigan Mensa.

The newsletter shall not include matters which are indecent, scandalous, libelous, or invade someone's privacy, nor shall copyrighted material be used without the permission of the owner. Ethnic, racist, sexist, or religious slurs shall not be printed. Northern Michigan Mensa recognizes that the newsletter is addressed to both minors and adults; material printed will be appropriate for distribution to minors.

All submissions are welcome and encouraged. They may be sent via email or snail mail. They may be sent as attachments or in the body of the email.

Submissions requiring major editing are also welcome. If requested, the author may approve the editing before the article is published.

Photographs are also welcome. Please include a brief description of the photo and the name of the photographer. You may also include an entire article to accompany the photo.

NMM Election Procedures for 2011 Election

The Nominating Committee has nominated the following individuals for the five openings for voting members on the Executive Committee for the period 2012 and 2013:

According to the NMM bylaws, these nominations are hereby published in this November issue of our newsletter. Also, according to the bylaws, additional nominations may be made by petition signed by at least five members of the local group and delivered to the chairperson of the Nominating Committee NO LATER THAN NOVEMBER 15. (Such petitions, if any, need to be conveyed to Jack Schultz by this date.) As of this posting, only five individuals have been nominated for the five vacant positions. The bylaws state that, if no additional nominations are received by November 15, then the five who have been nominated will be declared elected without the need for balloting by the membership. If one or more additional nominations are received by November 15, a ballot will be prepared and will be published in the December issue of Borealis. The mail ballots must then be returned to the chairperson of the Election Committee (Stan Cain) and received no later than December 20. Ballots received after that date will not be counted.

The chairperson of the Election Committee will certify the results of the election to the Local Secretary and shall have the election results published in the January issue of the newsletter. Any challenges to the election must be made in writing to the chairperson of the Election Committee and must be received by January 15. Any such challenges must be ruled on by January 31.

The outgoing Local Secretary shall notify the American Mensa Committee and the Regional Vice Chairman for Region 3 of the results of the election. The outgoing LocSec shall remain in office until the new LocSec has been elected by the voting members of the incoming Executive Committee. Any actions taken by the Executive Committee while a challenge is pending are not affected by the outcome of any such challenge.

Additional information: At its first meeting following the election, the incoming voting members of the Executive Committee shall elect from among themselves the new Local Secretary, the Deputy Local Secretary, and the Treasurer. The other two voting members shall be named as Members-at-Large.

Deep Wood Press Tour

In October, Northern Michigan Mensa was invited to tour Chad Pastotnik's quality letterpress printing facility, Deep Wood Press. Following a picnic lunch, Chad showed us around the buildings, explained and demonstrated his equipment and showed some examples of his fine work.

Deep Wood Press has continued the tradition of hand crafted printed items, bindings and book matter. With a foundation in fine art and a careful attention to craftsmanship and detail, the end result is more than a vehicle for information.

The books are printed via letterpress on fine papers and illustrated with quality artwork from original wood engravings, lino cuts and intaglio prints. These sheets are then bound by hand in traditional and contemporary book structures.

Dreamers of the Day: A Novel

Bibliomans' Book for December

By Maria Doria Russell, 288 pages

"I suppose I ought to warn you at the outset that my present circumstances are puzzling, even to me. Nevertheless, I am sure of this much: My little story has become your history. You won't really understand your times until you understand mine."

So begins the account of Agnes Shanklin, the charmingly diffident narrator of Maria Doria Russell's compelling new novel, *Dreamers of the Day*. And what is Miss Shanklin's "little story?" Nothing less than the creation of the modern Middle East at the 1921 Cairo Peace Conference, where Winston Churchill, T. E. Lawrence, and Lady Gertrude Bell met to decide the fate of the Arab world--and of our own.

A forty-year-old schoolteacher from Ohio, still reeling from the tragedies of the Great War and the influenza epidemic, Agnes has come into a modest inheritance that allows her to take the trip of a lifetime to Egypt and the Holy Land. Arriving at the Semiramis Hotel just as the Peace Conference convenes, Agnes, with her plainspoken American opinions--and a small, noisy dachshund named Rosie--enters into the company of the historic luminaries who will, in the space of a few days at a hotel in Cairo, invent the nations of Iraq, Syria, Lebanon, Israel, and Jordan.

Neither a pawn nor a participant at the conference, Agnes is ostensibly insignificant, and that makes her a welcome sounding board for Churchill, Lawrence, and Bell. It also makes her unexpectedly attractive to the charismatic German spy Karl Weilbacher. As Agnes observes the tumultuous inner workings of nation-building, she is drawn more and more deeply into geopolitical intrigue and toward a personal awakening.
