Mensa:

Mensa's constitution lists three purposes: to identify and foster human intelligence for the benefit of humanity; to encourage research into the nature, characteristics, and uses of intelligence; and to provide a stimulating intellectual and social environment for its members.

Mensa accepts individuals who score at or above the 98th percentile on certain standardized IQ tests, such as the Stanford-Binet.

Borealis is published by Northern Michigan Mensa (3/496) once each month under the auspices of its Executive Committee.

After mandatory items, priority in the newsletter is given to matters appealing to members of the group which relate to their membership in Mensa. The content of the newsletter shall appeal to the general membership of Northern Michigan Mensa.

The newsletter shall not include matters which are indecent, scandalous, libelous, or invade someone's privacy, nor shall copyrighted material be used without the permission of the owner. Ethnic, racist, sexist, or religious slurs shall not be printed. Northern Michigan Mensa recognizes that the newsletter is addressed to both minors and adults; material printed will be appropriate for distribution to minors.

All submissions are welcome and encouraged. They may be sent via email or snail mail. They may be sent as attachments or in the body of the email.

BOOK CLUB - Saturday, 4 April 2015

The April Book Club selection will be ***The Warmth of Other Suns: The Epic Story of America's Great Migration*** by Isabel Wilkerson, and presented by Heather Gruenberg-Seger.

In this epic, beautifully written masterwork, Pulitzer Prize-winning author Isabel Wilkerson chronicles one of the great untold stories of American history: the decades-long migration of black citizens who fled the South for northern and western cities, in search of a better life.

From 1915 to 1970, this exodus of almost six million people changed the face of America. Wilkerson compares this epic migration to the migrations of other peoples in history. She interviewed more than a thousand people, and gained access to new data and official records, to write this definitive and vividly dramatic account of how these American journeys unfolded, altering our cities, our country, and ourselves.

Wilkerson brilliantly captures their first treacherous and exhausting cross-country trips by car and train and their new lives in colonies that grew into ghettos, as well as how they changed these cities with southern food, faith and culture and improved them with discipline, drive and hard work. Both a riveting microcosm and a major assessment, ***The Warmth of Other Suns*** is a bold, remarkable and riveting work, a superb account of an “unrecognized immigration” within our own land.

2015 Mensa National Elections - A Closer Look

In the 2015 Mensa national elections next April, there will be no fewer than thirteen (13) different bylaws amendments for members to evaluate and vote on. There will also be multiple candidates for several of the national offices. This level of interest and participation on the national level has not been seen for quite some time - and it has gotten my attention. Having done a fair amount of research and then reviewed all 13 of the proposed bylaws amendments, I find myself unable to support anything substantive put forward by the current American Mensa Committee (AMC). Nor will I be supporting any of the incumbents on the AMC ExComm. Discussions continue on Facebook, yahoo groups and the Mensa Online Community, as well as in person across the country. I invite you to join the conversation.

A significant issue is the pattern of continuing dues increases, outpacing the inflation rate. The current AMC has approved these dues hikes but, until now, they have resisted repeated attempts by the current Treasurer, Nick Sanford - now running for Chairman - to institute automatic annual dues increases. We will have other choices for both Treasurer and Chairman this year; it behooves us to consider how our dues money is spent and whether we are getting additional value for higher annual dues. Several members have pointed to the ongoing expansion of the National Office without an ac-

companying growth in membership numbers. Others have called for a different approach to the budget process and an accompanying rollback of dues; to achieve this, we would need quite a different AMC and ExComm.

A careful reading of the proposed bylaws amendments, along with a review of this year's AMC meetings agendas and minutes, reveals quite a lot about the thinking of the incumbents who participated in the creation of AMC-approved amendments and who would be operating under the revised rules if those amendments were to pass. A recent RVC column by Julia Ashley (Region 3) and the subsequent response from Dayton Area Mensa's Ombudsman Pat Reising elucidate some of the issues relative to the position and role of the National Ombudsman. The links below lead to an exchange regarding two of the proposed bylaws amendments: #1, Replacement of the text of By-laws of American Mensa in entirety, and #12, Restore and Protect Powers of the National Ombudsman. An associated proposal, #11, Duties and Responsibilities of the National Ombudsman, is referred to indirectly in the writings and should be considered as part of the same discussion. Among these three amendments, I support #12 and plan to vote against #1 and #11.

Three Things We Can Fix This Election Cycle **Shayna Mali**

Mensa seems to have lost its way as an organization. This election offers us an unusual opportunity to examine who we think we are, where we want to be and who we shall choose to lead us toward our goals. Happily, these days it is relatively easy for members to get a sense of what's been going on. Just click on a few links, scroll down to the referenced articles and - voila - enlightenment!

“Here's the central question for Mensa's national election this year
- **Is Mensa a club or is Mensa a business?**” (1)

Fix Mensa's Finances

One reason for the incessant push to increase dues is the Equity Restoration program necessitated by the Inpharmatica trademark lawsuit initiated by the AMC in 2009. Few members are aware of this huge deficit; AMC actions taken at the March 2014 meeting could cause this important element of Mensa's internal finances to slip quietly off the radar. (2)(4)

We can - and must - do better when preparing and administering our budgets. (2)(3)(7)

Fix the American Mensa Committee (AMC)

“[Actions were] taken last year by the AMC, in violation of American Mensa Bylaws, to restrict [the National Ombudsman] from having the same information as AMC members.” (4)

“Some members have mentioned perceived disparities between the current AML bylaws and the process of the [AMC].” (5)

Chairman Burg's “dismissive response to comments from concerned members, display[ed] an unfortunate lack of leadership on the part of the person who was elected to lead American Mensa.” (6)

Two proposed bylaws amendments address “problematic conduct on the part of the AMC.” (7)

Fix the National Office (NO)

The NO has experienced:

“[a] steady loss of senior staff members under increasingly unpleasant circumstances...

over-budget expenditures year after year...

poorly-planned campaign roll-outs,

increasing reliance on... paid outsourcing firms instead of Mensa volunteers” (8) and

significant flaws in the processes and practices necessary for maintenance and upgrades to our technology systems. (9)

The Co-Chairs reported significant problems with NO staff and outside consultants while organizing the 2014 Boston AG. (4)

Despite this, Executive Director Donahoo was granted a salary increase.

In Conclusion

Ultimately, we members are responsible for Mensa. The AMC and National Office staff are empowered – by us – to handle our money and conduct the business of Mensa. Our club is currently headed in a less-than-brilliant direction. The candidates and bylaws amendments you vote for will affect whether we continue along the same path or change direction. When we ask questions, we must insist on meaningful answers. An informed vote is an *intelligent* vote.
